A community gives thanks

Three hundred volunteers, 75 turkeys, 95 cans of green beans and 1,500 dinner plates equal one massive community meal fit for up to 2,500 hungry Thanksgiving diners.

The numbers are enough to make anyone's head spin, but StoneBridge Church committee members have the planning down to a sort of science. The process is also helped along by good, old-fashioned math. "Some of it is just a simple math equation," says Stephanie Schack, children's director at StoneBridge and a member of the Thanksgiving dinner committee. If you're looking to prepare 2,000 servings of stuffing, for instance, you can whip out your calculator to determine just how much butter you'll need to get the job done. (Last year, all told, the meal required 240 1-pound blocks of butter.)

Planning is also determined based on the particular donations that come in each year. Basic menu items like turkey, green beans, potatoes and stuffing are non-negotiables, but other food items can change based on community giving. Schack says the committee started holding early planning sessions in the spring, and members have met monthly since summer. Past dinners have served an average of 2,000 plates — "give or take a few" — but the committee is prepared to serve 2,400 to 2,500.

Over 300 volunteers help pull off this lofty effort and make the whole thing look easy. Volunteers come from within the church and from neighboring congregations, area high schools, service clubs, businesses and private homes.

Volunteer opportunities begin Monday and continue through Thursday evening with cleanup. In those four days, volunteers prepare 75 turkeys and 89 cans of yams; mix up 19 5-gallon jugs of lemonade mix; and shuffle 1,500 dinner plates, 1,800 to-go containers and 4,000 napkins (among many, many more things).

Schack says that while the shopping list does add up — the cost of 1,280 pounds of turkey is estimated at about \$1,835, and desserts alone cost about \$1,500 — much of the food is donated. Financial donations pour in from local families and businesses, and the meal is and always will be free to attend.

While StoneBridge hosts the event, Schack says it is a community meal in every sense of the word.

"Sure, we house it here ... but it is truly a community effort. StoneBridge could not put this on by ourselves," she says. "This is by all means the community's meal. We're just proud to host it."

The true history of the dinner is a bit of an urban legend, Schack says. Most agree that it's been housed at the church for about 15 years, and many suggest the community meal originated at Red Lobster. People started gathering at the restaurant instead of cooking their own Thanksgiving meal, and soon outgrew the space. The meal then moved to another church before settling at the larger StoneBridge.

In keeping with the event's origins, the meal remains open to the general public. Attendees need not be a member of the church or have a financial need for a free dinner. Diners can come simply because they want to keep their own kitchen tidy, or because they're looking for some good company.

"No matter the reason ... come be with us. We'll be your family for the day," Schack says.

Serving is from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28. Dine-in and drive-thru are both available. The church is at 2111 Stonehedge Drive on Findlay's east side.

MATT BOSTDORFF



Some people praise Matt Bostdorff's dedication, while others, including myself, question his sanity. Make your own decision after reading his story.

Our next Human of Findlay was nominated by the Findlay and Hancock County K9 law enforcement officers for his years of dedication voluntarily helping train the K9 dogs of NW Ohio.

Matt Bostdorff, known by his close friends as "Boz", arrived in this world in 1976, taking up residence with his family on Devil's Hole road in Luckey, Ohio. Matt is the oldest child of Roger and Barb Bostdorff, joined later by sisters Christy and Cyndi. His father's career would take the family from Ohio to Michigan, down to Cleveland and finally back to the Toledo area. The family would finally put down permanent roots in Eastwood.

Matt graduated from Eastwood High School in 1994. He did well academically, earning a 3.8 GPA, and was chosen to be the Vice President of his class. He found his niche as a long-distance runner while in middle school, eventually becoming good enough to run in district and region events in high school. He won the league championship in his senior year. His record was strong enough for him to earn a scholarship from BGSU.

Matt started attending BGSU as an "undecided major" but eventually found his interest in Electronic Technology gradually learning how to dismantle and repair motor controls, circuits and more. This was also during the very early years of the internet and Matt was hooked on the blossoming technology. Matt graduated with a degree focused in Electronic Technology. After graduation Matt worked for a time in Dallas until the tech company was bought out. He returned to Ohio, joining the Buehrer Group, an architectural engineering firm that designed buildings, specifically schools. Matt was responsible for designing and setting up the data, video and voice systems in schools all over Ohio. In 2002 he was part of the team that designed the Van Buren "Castle" elementary building. When the project was finished, he was speaking with the superintendent who shared that the Van Buren school district had no one to manage this new high tech "state of the art" system. Matt jumped at this opportunity and has spent the next 16 years implementing and overseeing the system. This included providing "Netbooks" to every student resulting in a paperless system. (He has moved on after the 2018 school year to assume the technology management role at his alumni Eastwood school district.) He met his wife Nickey in 2005 at a basketball game he was announcing. "She was different from anyone I had ever dated. She was very mature, comfortable to be around and I felt I could relax and just be myself. By the third date I knew." They would merge households shortly afterwards. They made it permanent in 2013. "I married my best friend that day," states Matt. Nickey and Matt were close friends with Bowling Green police officer Gordon Finger and his wife when Gordon chose to become a K9 officer. When Gordon returned from initial training with his new partner Arci, he offhandedly asked Matt if he would help train Arci by being a "suspect", putting on a protective suit and allow the dog to practice bites on him. "I was like, I can do this one time. I wanted to give it a try. I arrived at the old BG airport at the agreed time to find not one but ten K9 teams waiting to have a shot at biting me!! I quickly learned these were not "fluffy" nips. These dogs were rocket launchers that appeared to want to rip my face off!"

By the end of the three-hour training session Matt was still in one piece, was hooked and is "celebrating" three years of being a "bite decoy" every Monday evening for the NW Ohio K9 group. Matt has become very close friends with the officers of this group. "It's like a brotherhood and I am very humbled that they have accepted and taken me in."

Matt shared a painful life-changing event. "I was looking for someway to be more involved in in my community, to make a difference. I considered entering local politics, such as city council or school board. Then one day my world changed, when a dear friend and close associate committed suicide. I worked with him every day and I missed the signs. It shook me to my core. I began to question: "Why am I here? What purpose am I serving? Could I have done anything different?"

"Only one thing helped me cope with that incredible pain and loss. Working with the dogs every week I found a release."

Two recent events have started to give Matt peace and to validate his efforts these past three years. In the past several months, two of "his" K9 teams were involved with dangerous individuals. It was necessary to deploy the dogs and the suspects were quickly apprehended by bites from K9's Deke (FPD) and Charlie (HCSO). Both K9 officers called Matt immediately after the apprehensions to thank him. They were very grateful to "Boz" as they affectionately call him. Because of his dedication and willingness to help train these amazing police dogs, no citizens or officers were hurt. Matt sees no end in sight to his helping "take a bite out of crime."


